**Answer:** C) To bridge the gap between the fictional world and the audience's reality

Breaking the fourth wall is a structural choice used to engage the audience's critical thinking and connect the play's themes to their own lives.

Subtext is the unspoken meaning hidden 'underneath' the lines; it requires the audience to infer motivation based on context.

**Answer:** C) Atmospheric tension

Tension is a dramatic tool used to keep the audience or reader engaged by creating a sense of urgency or impending danger.

**8. In Shakespeare's 'A Midsummer Night's Dream,' the confusion caused by Puck's love potion demonstrates how \_\_\_\_\_ can be used to drive a comedic plot structure.**

**Answer:** D) Situational irony

Situational irony occurs when the outcome of a situation is the opposite of what was intended, a key device in dramatic comedy.

**9. True or False: The 'Proscenium' refers to the underlying message or moral lesson the playwright wants the audience to learn.**

**Answer:** B) False

The proscenium is a physical part of the stage (the arch); the 'theme' is the term for the underlying message or moral.

**10. How does the 'linear structure' of a play like 'Twelve Angry Men' contribute to its overall dramatic effect?**

**Answer:** B) By focusing on a single time and place to intensify the psychological pressure

A tight linear structure—especially one that observes the 'unity of time and place'—builds claustrophobia and focus in a dramatic work.
