Said's theory is a foundational lens in World Literature for examining how power dynamics influence the depiction of the 'Other'.

Answer: A) By arguing that life is meaningful because it only happens once

Kundera contrasts 'lightness' (the singularity of life) with 'heaviness' (destiny/repetition) against the backdrop of the Prague Spring.

Answer: A) True

FitzGerald's translation is a key example of how world literature is shaped by the bridge—and sometimes the liberties taken—by the translator.

10. Kenzaburō Ōe's works, such as 'A Personal Matter', are often analyzed for their synthesis of _____ and the existential crisis of post-WWII Japan.

Answer: B) Disability and parenthood

Ōe often uses the birth of a brain-damaged son as a microcosm for the trauma and resilience of a nation redefine its identity.
