**1. In Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o's 'A Grain of Wheat', the character Mugo is celebrated as a hero of the Uhuru movement. How does the narrative structure reflect the complexity of post-independence identity?**

**Answer:** B) Through fragmented flashbacks that parallel the fractured national psyche.

Thiong'o utilizes a nonlinear structure and shifting perspectives to mirror the psychological trauma and internal conflicts of a nation transitioning from colonial rule.

The 'Love Laws' refer to the rigid social and caste codes that dictate acceptable relationships and lead to the central tragedy of the novel.
