Young learners solve real-world safety puzzles by identifying digital 'stranger danger' and practicing the 'Ask First' rule before clicking new buttons.

Answer: B) Ask a grown-up for help before clicking

Using the 'Key' metaphor helps students understand that passwords provide access and must be kept secure to protect their digital space.

4. Which of these is okay to share with a person you just met online?

Answer: C) Your favorite color

Students must differentiate between Personally Identifiable Information (PII) and non-sensitive information like a favorite color.

5. It is okay to use your iPad in the bathtub since it is a safe place.

Answer: B) False

Physical safety and device care are foundational modules in early childhood technology curriculums (Digital Citizenship).

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6. If a game asks for your _____ number, you should never type it in without asking a parent.

Answer: A) Phone

Recognizing specific types of private data, like a phone number, is a key formative assessment goal for this age group.

7. A new game asks to take a picture of your face. What should you do first?

Answer: B) Ask an adult if it is safe

This teaches application of the 'Permission First' rule regarding biometric data and privacy.

8. Everything you see on the internet is always true.

Answer: B) False

Introducing basics of information literacy prevents future susceptibility to scams and misinformation.

9. Before you download a new _____, you must ask a grown-up.

Answer: B) App

Guided access and adult supervision are critical for early childhood cybersecurity to prevent accidental malware downloads.

10. If you accidentally see something online that makes you feel scared or sad, what is the best thing to do?

Answer: B) Tell an adult you trust
