Little ones build a foundation for justice by designing solutions for sharing and recognizing how brave friends made the world kinder for everyone.

1. If you saw a 'Whites Only' sign at a water fountain today, how would you change it to make it fair for all children?

Answer: A) Paint a sign that says 'Everyone is Welcome'

Synthesis at this level involves creating a solution for inclusion. Changing the sign to welcome everyone promotes the core Civil Rights value of equality.

2. Ruby Bridges was a very brave girl who showed us that even children can help change unfair rules.

Answer: A) True

Ruby Bridges is a primary example of a child activist whose courage in integrating an all-white school demonstrated that anyone can fight for fairness.

3. When people march together holding signs and singing songs to change a rule that isn't nice, it is called a ____.

Answer: A) Protest

Defining a protest in age-appropriate terms helps children identify the collective action used during the Civil Rights Movement.

4. Imagine you are making a 'Friendship Rule Book' for your school. Which rule would help stop 'Segregation' (keeping people apart)?

Answer: C) We invite everyone to the table, no matter what

Evaluating and creating 'fair rules' requires children to synthesize the concept of integration into their own daily social contexts.

Answer: A) Freedom Singers

Focusing on the role of art and music (The Freedom Singers) introduces different forms of activism beyond the most commonly cited leaders.

6. Bayard Rustin helped organize a huge walk to tell leaders to be fair, showing us that planning and teamwork are important.

Answer: A) True

Introducing Bayard Rustin emphasizes the 'teamwork' and 'behind-the-scenes' planning (synthesis of logistics and movement goals) necessary for change.

7. If you wanted to follow the example of Diane Nash and her friends who sat at lunch counters peacefully, what would you do if someone was mean to you?

Answer: B) Stay calm and keep showing them kindness

The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) strategies require children to understand the complex reasoning of non-violent resistance.

8. Fannie Lou Hamer wanted everyone to have a ___ so they could help choose the leaders of our country.

Answer: A) Vote

Using Fannie Lou Hamer introduces the concept of voting rights as a tool for making 'fair choices' in society.

9. Septima Clark was a teacher who helped adults learn to read so they could stand up for themselves. Why is learning important for unfair rules?

Answer: A) It helps us know our rights and use our voices

This demonstrates the link between education and empowerment, key to the 'Citizenship Schools' founded by Septima Clark.

10. To start a movement for fairness, you first have to notice when something is not right and then talk to your friends about how to fix it.

Answer: A) True

Synthesizing the entire movement into a 'how-to' for toddlers encourages them to apply the reasoning of civil rights to their own lives.
