Answer: C) Because it could expand their 'exclusive economic zone' for fishing and underwater minerals

Ownership of land in the sea allows a country to claim the surrounding waters (usually 200 nautical miles) for economic use and military defense.

5. The 'Great Rift Valley' in Africa creates deep lakes and steep cliffs. For a 5th-grade geographer, this physical feature is a _____ to easy transportation between East and West Africa.

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Answer: C) Barrier

Rugged terrain like rifts and mountains act as barriers, making trade and communication more expensive and difficult between regions.

6. True or False: If a river like the Mekong flows through six different countries, the country at the very beginning (upstream) has no geopolitical power over the water.

Answer: B) False

Upstream countries (like China with the Mekong) have high leverage because their dams or usage can directly affect the water supply for all countries downstream.

7. The Bosphorus Strait in Turkey is a very narrow waterway connecting the Black Sea to the Mediterranean. In geopolitics, this is known as a:

Answer: B) Chokepoint

A chokepoint is a narrow route that can be easily blocked or controlled, giving the country that owns it immense power over global shipping.

8. The Andes Mountains run through seven South American countries. This feature often forces these nations to develop _____ specialized in high-altitude movement rather than flatland tanks.

Answer: C) Militaries

Geography dictates how a country defends itself; mountainous nations focus on specialized infantry and air power rather than heavy ground vehicles.

9. True or False: A 'forward capital' is a city moved to a specific location to show a country's intention to develop or protect a certain geographic area.

Answer: A) True

Countries like Brazil (moving to Brasília) or Nigeria (moving to Abuja) moved their capitals to centralize power or encourage growth in the interior.

10. Why might a country like Australia be considered geographically 'secure' compared to a country in Central Europe?

Answer: A) It is an island continent with no immediate land borders with rivals

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Being surrounded by water provides a 'moat' effect, making invasion much more difficult than it is for countries with many neighbors on flat plains.
