## Answer Key: Dissect the Blueprint: A 11th Grade Writing Process Architect Quiz

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**1. When moving from a rough draft to a 'shitty first draft' (as Anne Lamott suggests) toward a formal submission, which action defines the 'Global Revision' stage rather than local editing?**

**Answer:** B) Identifying a logical fallacy in the third paragraph and restructuring the argument's premises.

Global revision involves high-level changes to logic, structure, and thesis alignment (scaffolding the argument), whereas the other options focus on micro-level editing or formatting.

**Answer:** B) False

Premature editing or 'polishing' during the drafting phase can stifle the flow of ideas and leading to writer's block; fluency should be prioritized over accuracy initially.

**Answer:** B) Submitting an argumentative op-ed to the local newspaper for public consideration.

Publishing requires sharing the work with an intentional audience, transforming the text from a private exercise into public discourse.

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
