Evaluate strategic grand-design tensions as the U.S. shifts from the Stimson Doctrine to total global mobilization through complex geopolitical analysis.

1. The 1941 Atlantic Charter, negotiated between FDR and Churchill, was significant primarily because it:

Answer: B) Established post-war goals including self-determination and freedom of the seas.

The Atlantic Charter provided the ideological foundation for the United Nations and the post-war international order, emphasizing decolonization and collective security.

2. Executive Order _____, issued in 1941, prohibited racial discrimination in the national defense industry, representing a precursor to the modern Civil Rights Movement.

Answer: B) 8802

Executive Order 8802 was signed by FDR in response to A. Philip Randolph's threatened March on Washington, establishing the Fair Employment Practice Committee.

3. The Supreme Court case *Korematsu v. United States* (1944) ruled that the 'military necessity' of internment overrode individual constitutional rights during wartime.

Answer: A) True

The Court applied the 'strict scrutiny' standard but ultimately deferred to the executive branch's argument regarding wartime security, a decision heavily criticized by modern legal scholars.

4. A critical strategic tension between the 'Big Three' at the Tehran Conference involved:

Answer: A) Stalin's demand for an immediate second front in Western Europe to relieve the Red Army.

Stalin was frustrated by delays in the invasion of France (Operation Overlord), as the Soviet Union was bearing the brunt of German land forces on the Eastern Front.

6. Navajo Code Talkers were essential to the Pacific Theater primarily because their language:

The Navajo language had no written form and a complex structure, making it the only oral military code never decrypted by the enemy.

7. The Battle of the Bulge was Germany's final major offensive on the Eastern Front intended to capture Moscow.

The Battle of the Bulge was a German counter-offensive on the Western Front aiming to split Allied lines in the Ardennes Forest.
