Pathos refers to emotional appeals. Critical readers separate emotional weight from the actual logical merits of an argument.

6. If an editorial in a newspaper uses the phrase 'The Governor's disastrous and reckless economic plan,' a critical reader identifies this as:

Answer: B) Loaded language used to signal a subjective opinion.

Adjectives like 'disastrous' and 'reckless' are value judgments, indicating the author's stance rather than an empirical fact.

7. True or False: Formative assessment of one's own comprehension during critical reading involves stopping to summarize complex paragraphs to ensure the logic flows.

Answer: A) True

Active summarization is a metacognitive strategy that aids in the analysis and synthesis of complex information.

8. When reading Thomas Kuhn's 'The Structure of Scientific Revolutions,' a student identifies a 'paradigm shift.' Searching for what the author *assumes* without stating it directly is the process of uncovering _____.

Answer: A) implied premises

Implied premises are unstated assumptions that must be true for the author's conclusion to hold; finding them is a key critical reading skill.

9. Which scenario best demonstrates the critical reading skill of 'Analyzing Arguments'?

Answer: B) Mapping out how a philosopher's secondary claims build toward their main thesis.

Analyzing an argument involves breaking down the structure of how claims and evidence are linked to support a central conclusion.

10. True or False: In the context of critical reading, a 'primary source' like a diary entry from 1914 is considered more reliable than a 'secondary source' like a 2024 history textbook for all types of research.

Answer: B) False

Reliability is contextual. While a primary source provides direct evidence, a secondary source often provides critical synthesis and peer-reviewed analysis that a single diary lacks.
