Synthesize 10 high-stakes decisions regarding recursive drafting and rhetorical velocity in this advanced senior-level challenge.

1. A student utilizes a 'post-outline' after completing a 2,000-word draft of a literary analysis on Gabriel García Márquez. This specific meta-cognitive strategy is best categorized as which recursive phase?
