When the curtain rises on complex subtext, students must distinguish between stated intent and the psychological architecture of a scene.

1. In August Strindberg's 'Miss Julie', the character Julie belongs to the aristocracy while Jean is a valet. When analyzing their power dynamic, which literary lens is most effective for evaluating their tragic trajectory?

Answer: A) Marxist criticism focusing on class struggle and social determinism

To analyze 'Miss Julie' at a high school level, students must move beyond plot to see how the socio-economic status of the characters (class struggle) creates the central conflict.

2. In Wole Soyinka's 'Death and the King's Horseman', the conflict between Elesin's ritual duty and the British colonial intervention highlights a _____, where two valid but incompatible moral systems collide.

Answer: B) Cultural Antinomy

Cultural antinomy refers to a contradiction between two laws or principles, which characterizes the high-stakes clash between Yoruba tradition and colonial law in the play.

3. True or False: In dramatic works, 'Subtext' refers exclusively to the literal words spoken by characters during a climactic scene.

Answer: B) False

Subtext is the implicit meaning 'under' the lines—what is felt or thought rather than what is explicitly stated.

Answer: B) To ensure the audience remains emotionally detached and critically objective

Brecht used distance to prevent the audience from losing themselves in emotion, forcing them to think critically about the social and political messages of the play.

Anagnorisis is the specific Greek term for the critical moment of discovery or recognition in a play's structure.

The inciting incident is the specific event that disrupts the status quo and launches the protagonist into the main action of the plot.

Expressionism in drama uses stylized effects to represent inner psychological realities rather than outward objective reality.
