The second-person 'you' creates an immediate, visceral connection, forcing the reader to step into the difficult experiences of the character.

8. A writer who utilizes 'defamiliarization' is attempting to present common objects or situations in a strange or ____ way to enhance perception.

Defamiliarization (Ostranenie) is a technique used to provoke new perspectives by describing the mundane as if seen for the first time.

Unreliability is a deliberate narrative device where the reader must look past the narrator's perspective to find the actual truth of the story.
