**1. Your town is building a new 'Butterfly Highway' with wildflowers. If you want to know how this helps the Earth, who is the best person to interview for your report?**

**Answer:** B) A scientist who studies insects

To analyze a news story about nature, we look for experts, like scientists, who understand how plants and animals work together.

**2. When a news story only tells one side of a problem and ignores the other, we call this \_\_\_\_.**

**Answer:** C) Bias

Bias happens when a reporter favors one side instead of being fair to everyone involved in the story.

**3. True or False: If a news story is about a new park in Japan, that is considered a 'Local' news story for someone living in Chicago.**

**Answer:** B) False

Local news happens in your own community or city; a story about a different country is an international story.

**4. Imagine your school wants to ban plastic straws. To see both sides, you should talk to a student who loves the ocean AND:**

**Answer:** B) A student who needs a straw to drink

Good analysis requires looking at how a change might hurt some people even if it helps the environment.

Journalists are the professionals who gather facts and write reports about current events.

**9. A \_\_\_ is a short sentence at the top of a news story that tells you the big idea.**

**Answer:** B) Headline

Headlines are used to grab attention and summarize the main point of the current event.

**10. True or False: Asking 'Who, What, Where, and Why' is a great way to start analyzing any news story.**

**Answer:** A) True
