Synthesize unreliable perspectives and intricate stylistic shifts as you move from foundational prose to complex, multi-layered literary architecture.

1. In a narrative utilizing 'stream of consciousness'—similar to the stylistic innovations of Virginia Woolf or James Joyce—what is the primary function of the prose structure?
